How to plan and prepare for floods



Are you at risk of flood?

The Macalister River flows south from Glencairn and Licola, through Lake Glenmaggie, Tinamba, Riverslea and Bundalaguah to where it joins the Thomson River north of Sale.

Lake Glenmaggie is a small weir used to store water for the Macalister Irrigation District. It is not able to store large volumes of water or prevent floods. Water is released in a measured way to try to minimise the effects of floods downstream of the weir, if possible.

Floods in Tinamba may occur when 30,000ML/day of water are released from Glenmaggie Weir. This can result in water running through the intersection of the Maffra-Traralgon Road at Tinamba with businesses and homes at risk of flooding above floor level.

Similarly, above floor flooding in Newry can occur when the outflow from Glenmaggie is greater than 60,000ML/day. This rate causes flood waters to spread out across the farmlands and funnel through the town. Early evacuation is important when major floods are predicted for this area.

The town of Maffra is on the eastern bank of the Macalister. Flooding within the town is limited.

Rural areas in the vicinity of Maffra such as Mewburn Park, Bellbird Corner, Riverslea, Bundalaguah and Myrtlebank can have widespread rural flooding as the catchment spreads out and the water slows.

Local heavy rain can also cause flooding even when the upper catchment is dry, so be aware of local conditions.

Understanding Warnings

Flood Watches & Flood Warnings are issued by the Bureau of Meteorology to tell people about possible flooding.

A Flood Watch means there is a developing weather pattern that might cause flooding in one or two days.

Flood Warnings mean flooding is about to happen or is already happening. There are Minor, Moderate or Major flood warnings.

VICSES will give local information about how the flood water is affecting people and properties. This includes safety messages to remind you what to do.

Severe Weather Warning or Severe Thunderstorm Warnings are issued when damaging winds, possible hail and FLASH FLOODING is expected.

Flash Flooding happens when heavy rain causes a very fast rise of water on low-lying land or a rush of damaging water downhill on steep properties. There may be little or no warning time.



Emergency Alert may be used to send emergency messages to your mobile phone or landline. If you receive an emergency alert, pay attention and take it seriously. Act immediately.

NEVER ...

Never walk, play, ride or drive in floodwaters.

This is the main cause of death and injury during floods.

As little as 20 centimetres of fast flowing water can knock you off your feet!

How SES can help you

The State Emergency Service is a volunteer organisation trained to manage floods, storms & other emergencies.

SES volunteers may help by:

- · giving advice on how to plan and prepare
- · helping to protect properties
- rescuing people from flood water
- protecting essential services like hospitals and powerstations
- · helping with temporary repairs to reduce danger



Evacuation

During a flood, the SES and other emergency services may advise you by Emergency Alert, radio broadcast or door-knock to prepare to leave your home.

- listen to warnings and advice act early
- be aware conditions can change rapidly roads or escape routes may close or become dangerous

When you evacuate, report to a relief centre. If you choose to shelter with a friend or relative, tell authorities where you are staying. Do not return home until advised it is safe to do so.

A well-prepared community can reduce flood damage by up to 80%.

Be prepared for floods by having an Emergency Plan:

- understand your flood risk
- · know what to do and when to do it
- where to get emergency updates
- · have a safe evacuation route

What you can do now

Find out if you live or work in a flood-prone area. Contact your local Council or SES unit. Ask your neighbours.

Get prepared:

- keep a list of emergency numbers by the phone & in your mobile
- · put together an Emergency Kit
- develop an Emergency Plan make sure everyone in your family and workplace knows what to do

Home Emergency kit

- a copy of your Home or Business Emergency Plan
- · battery powered torch and radio/spare batteries
- · water and food for three days
- · first aid kit, duct tape, matches, phone charger
- · rubber and strong leather gloves
- important papers, mementoes, photos
- · medications and scripts
- special needs for infants, disabled, the elderly & pets

Quick Check List BEFORE THE FLOOD: Check your home and contents insurance cover for flood Keep a list of emergency numbers near the telephone and in your mobile phone Put together an Emergency Kit and prepare a Home or Business Emergency Plan -see: www.ses.vic.gov.au When you hear a FloodWatch or weather warning Listen to local radio and SKY News for warnings and advice Notice what is happening outside Check your Emergency Plan and Kit and take these with you if you evacuate When flooding may be imminent (a Flood Warning) Make sure family members and neighbours are aware of the situation Be ready to evacuate if advised by emergency services Secure valuables and important documents as high as possible Turn off water, gas and electricity at the mains Secure objects likely to float and cause damage. Raise chemicals and oils well above floor level. Move machinery, pumps and livestock to known higher ground. If necessary, lay sand-filled bags to help protect your property. If you are likely to become isolated, make sure you have a good supply of food, water and medications **DURING THE FLOOD** For emergency assistance, call 132 500 for VICSES DO NOT drive, ride or walk through floodwaters NEVER allow children to play in floodwaters Stay well clear of fallen trees, fallen power lines and damaged structures or buildings Listen for updates and stay aware as conditions can change AFTER THE FLOOD If your property has been flooded, call your local municipality for support Have electrical/gas equipment professionally tested prior to use. Check your smoke alarms are still working. Go to www.health.vic.gov.au for health warnings, clean-up tips, protective clothing requirements and advice on safe handling of food and water

LOCAL FLOOD INTELLIGENCE

based on outflow from gauges at Glenmaggie Weir

MAJOR Flood - 5.2m. 35.000ML/day

Main Street of Newry may experience fast flows when outflow from weir reaches 60,000ML/day - early evacuation essential - travel through Newry and Tinamba blocked

Low-lying areas downstream of Newry and Tinamba such as Riverslea, Mewburn Park and Bundalaguah may have extensive flooding across rural properties & roads

River flows along the western edge of Maffra. Properties & access affected in town in Maffra-Newry Rd near sports oval & River St. Macalister Park near the western bridge may also be closed

River flows just south of Licola, flooding low areas of the Licola Lions Club Village, some parts of Target Creek Rd & the Licola-Jamieson Rd

Lake Glenmaggie outflow blocks access to Coongulla via Ryans Rd but access north is possible

MODERATE Flood - 4.0m. 22.000ML/day

If Major flooding predicted, evacuate early - this catchment can flood quickly

At 30,000ML/day outflow, Tinamba intersection may be covered with running water with access affected. Newry-Tinamba Road & Maffra/Traralgon Rd closed, although Newry township not at risk at this level.

Caravan park on the shore of Lake Glenmaggie may flood.

MINOR Flood - 2.3m. 7.500ML/day

Rural properties may be effected - property owners should move pumps & stock to higher ground

FLOODWATCH

Weather system developing which may cause flooding, generally low pressure system from southern NSW or Central Australia - watch for these patterns and plan ahead

Listen to local radio & SKY News for information updates
